What is Teaching with Primary Sources - Colorado?

Funded by a grant from the Library of Congress and housed at the Metropolitan State College of Denver, Teaching with Primary Sources-Colorado promotes the use of primary sources in instruction across the state and at all grade levels.

We pursue our goals in the following ways:

- Offering free professional development (in-services, traditional and online workshops, special events)
- Collaborating with local educators who develop standards-based coursework to meet their needs and integrate with programs already in place
- Providing expertise and technology to produce digital or large format primary sources for use in classrooms
- Creating a network of educators to serve as mentors, ambassadors and trainers for harnessing Library of Congress materials in the classroom

What are Primary Sources? Why use them in the classroom?

Primary sources are snippets of history that may include letters, manuscripts, diaries, journals, newspapers, speeches, photos, interviews, and others. They often come with minimal context. Working with primary sources requires students to be analytical, to examine sources thoughtfully, and to determine what else they need to know to make inferences from the material. History comes alive for students that are motivated by primary sources. Analysis of primary sources will deepen student understanding of the curriculum through developing students' memory, reason, and imagination to foster empathy for the past, perspectives on the present, and the ability to influence the future.

Who is eligible to participate in Teaching with Primary Sources-Colorado programs?

Teaching with Primary Sources – Colorado professional development programs are free to all Colorado K-12 educators, including:

- In-service and pre-service teachers
- College faculty
- Librarians
- Media specialists
- Educational support personnel.

Is there a fee or tuition charge for Teaching with Primary Sources-Colorado programs (workshops, events, etc.)?

No. Teaching with Primary Sources-Colorado programs (events, workshops, etc.) are offered FREE to educators.

Those choosing to earn graduate credits for Teaching with Primary Sources-Colorado workshops, however, do pay a fee (cost per credit hour) through one of three available institutions in Colorado (Adams State College, Colorado State University and the University of Colorado at Denver), but it is not a requirement.

Why should I participate?

As a Teaching with Primary Sources-Colorado participant, you join local, regional and national networks of educators committed to using Library of Congress online materials and other digital primary sources to improve learning in the classroom. As your skills grow, mentoring others in this valuable teaching method extends the Teaching with Primary Sources mission. Ultimately, your efforts in this area prepare students to succeed in our increasingly complicated and information-soaked society.

Teaching with Primary Sources Foundations

Overview:

Overview:
